



2023 Legislative Agenda

Approved by Children's Home Society of Florida's Board of Directors on September 9, 2022.

The Children's Home Society of Florida (CHS) Board of Directors is proud of the successes during the 2022 Session. The outstanding efforts of our local and state leaders, advocates, team members, and volunteers is to be commended. These efforts helped to advance necessary funding increases to support the continuation of successful and effective programs serving Florida's children and families. The Board remains committed to ensuring our children are prioritized while striving for quality and excellence in all we do.

We offer the following legislative priorities for the 2023 Legislature to consider:

Improve System Accountability & Reduce Harm to Children

Current practice in the child welfare system shifts more and more liability risk to be shouldered by private nonprofit child welfare community providers – even for actions or omissions by state and lead agencies. This limits adequate compensation from corresponding entities to children who have been harmed and allows bad behavior to continue from organizations that are not held responsible. This lack of system accountability and fairness impacts the insurance coverage for child welfare providers, increasing premiums and potentially placing them at risk for non-renewal. All threaten the stability and ability for providers to deliver much-needed services to children and families and increases the risk of children being harmed. Without legislative action prohibiting state agencies and lead agencies from this practice, it can negatively impact children and threaten provider sustainability.

- ★ **CHS seeks to modify statute to require ALL parties involved in the child welfare system to be held liable for their own actions or omissions, and prohibit any contract from requiring such indemnification to other parties.**



Expand a Proven Model to Success: Community Partnership Schools

Community Partnership Schools eliminate barriers to learning that can prevent many children from reaching their full potential: poverty, hunger, safe housing, and unmet health and mental health needs. Community Partnership Schools address these issues and create greater long-term access to services and supports for students and their families, which can positively impact their futures.

Strengthen Families through Post-Adoption Services

Families created through adoption often need additional supports and/or access to resources to maintain the family unit. Currently there are very few requirements regarding the array of services and supports that must be available for families to access after the adoption is complete. Additionally, there are drastic inconsistencies in post-adoption services and supports from one community to the next. The current system of care needs improvement to better inform, prepare and work with families throughout the adoption process and journey, offering families the opportunity to stay connected in the years following the legal finalization.

- ★ **CHS requests support to develop an evidenced-based post-adoption system of care to keep more families strong and together.**
